


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Ken Johnston

Ken Johnston was born in Glasgow, brought up in Aberdeen, and now lives and works in East Lothian.

Ken has a particular interest in choral music and has written many pieces for youth and adult choirs. These include arrangements of traditional Scottish songs and original works for upper or mixed voices.

In recent years he has been commissioned to write works for events such as Holocaust Memorial Day, the BBC's Proms in the Park and for the 40th anniversary celebrations of the Aberdeen International Youth Festival.



He has written for performers including the National Youth Choir of Scotland, Edinburgh Quartet, Cadenza, Hadley Court Singers and Farnham Youth Choir.

A number of Ken's pieces have been published by Boosey and Hawkes, NYCoS and Roberton publications.

I Landed with Seven Men combines his new arrangements of traditional well-known Scottish folk songs - Charlie is My Darling, Johnnie Cope, Wi' a Hundred Pipers, the Skye Boat Song and Will Ye No' Come Back Again? - with a historical narrative written by Jim Maxwell. It tells the story of Charles Edward Stuart and the Jacobite Rebellion in words and song.

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




Dr Karl Jenkins CBE OBE

A recent exhaustive survey shows that Karl Jenkins is now the most performed living composer in the world. Educated at Gowerton Grammar School, Cardiff University and the Royal Academy of Music, London, The Armed Man: A Mass For Peace alone has been performed nearly 1000 times in 20 different countries since the CD was released while his recorded output has resulted in seventeen gold and platinum disc awards.

It was in jazz that he initially made his mark, followed by a period with Soft Machine, one of the seminal bands of the 70's. In the field of advertising music he has won numerous awards, and Bafta 'gongs' for his scores for the documentaries The Celts and Testament.



After this period as a media composer, his return to the music mainstream was initially marked by the success of the Adiemus project. Adiemus, combining the 'classical' with ethnic vocal sounds and percussion with an invented language, topped classical and 'pop' charts around the world.

His output includes the harp concerto 'Over The Stone' commissioned by HRH the Prince of Wales for the Royal Harpist, Catrin Finch, Euphonium Concerto for David Childs, the concertante 'Quirk', commissioned by the London Symphony Orchestra and conducted by Sir Colin Davies as part of its 2005 centenary season, 'Tlep' written for virtuoso violinist Marat Bisengaliev and 'In These Stones Horizons Sing', featuring Bryn Terfel, Catrin Finch with the WNO Orchestra & Chorus which was premiered at the Royal Gala opening of the Welsh Millennium Centre in the presence of Her Majesty The Queen.

In the summer of 2005 he scored the feature film, River Queen starring Kiefer Sutherland & Samantha Morton, the soundtrack of which won the Golden Goblet award for best score at the Shanghai Film Festival

In 2004 he entered Classic FM's 'Hall of Fame" at no 8., the highest position for a living composer and has since been the highest placed living composer, as well as, in 2006, no. 4 amongst British composers.

Karl holds a D.Mus [Doctor of Music] degree from the University of Wales, has been made both a Fellow and an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music, where a room has been named in his honour, and has fellowships at Cardiff University, Swansea University, the Royal Welsh College of Music & Drama, Trinity College Carmarthen, Swansea Metropolitan University and was also presented by Classic FM with the 'Red f' award for 'outstanding service to classical music'

He has been the subject of the ITV South Bank Show by Lord [Melvyn] Bragg as well as being a 'castaway' on 'Desert Island Discs' and was recently made a Freeman of the City of London.

He was awarded an OBE, by Her Majesty The Queen, in the 2005 New Year's Honours List and a CBE in the 2010 Birthday Honours List "for services to music".

The Armed Man

The Mass begins with a marching army and the beat of military drums, the orchestra gradually building to the choir's entrance, singing the 15th-century theme tune - The Armed Man. After the scene is set, the style and pace changes and we are prepared for reflection by first the Moslem Call to Prayer (Adhan) and then the Kyrie, which pays homage to the past by quoting (in the Christe Eleison) from Palestrina's setting of L'Homme Armé. Next, to a plainsong setting, we hear words from the Psalms asking for God's help against our enemies. The Sanctus that follows is full of menace, and has a primeval, tribal character that adds to its power. The menace grows in the next movement as Kipling's Hymn Before Action builds to its final devastating line "Lord grant us strength to die."

War is now inevitable. Charge opens with a seductive paean to martial glory which is followed by the inevitable consequence - war in all its uncontrolled cacophony of destruction, then the eerie silence of the battlefield after the battle and, finally, the burial of the dead. Surely nothing can be worse than this? But think again. At the very centre of the work is Angry Flames, an excerpt from a poem about the horrors of the atom bomb attack on Hiroshima written by a poet who was there at the time and died in 1953 of leukemia brought on by exposure to radiation. But if we think that the obscenity of this mass destruction is new to our consciousness, we must reconsider as we listen, to the eerily similar passage from the ancient Indian epic The Mahabharata.

From the horror of mass destruction the work turns to remember that one death is one too many, that each human life is sacred and unique. First the Agnus Dei, with its lyrical chorale theme, reminds us of Christ's ultimate sacrifice and this is followed by an elegiac setting of some lines I wrote (to accompany one of the dramatic interpretations we use in the museum) about the feelings of loss and guilt that so many of the survivors of the First World War felt when they came home but their friends did not.

Even the survivors can be hurt to destruction by war. The Benedictus heals those wounds in its slow and stately affirmation of faith and leads us to the final, positive, climax of the work. This begins back where we started in the 15th century with Lancelot and Guinevere's declaration, born of bitter experience, that peace is better than war. The menace of the 'Armed Man' theme returns and vies for a time with Malory's desire for peace. But time moves on and we come to our moment of commitment. Do we want the new millennium to be like the last? Or do we join with Tennyson when he tells us to "Ring out the thousand wars of old, Ring in the thousand years of peace"? It may seem an impossible dream, we may not have begun too well, but the Mass ends with the affirmation from Revelations that change is possible, that sorrow, pain and death can be overcome. Dona nobis pacem.



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

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Brianna Robertson - Soprano

Brianna graduated with 1st class honours in a Bachelor of Music degree from The University of Glasgow. She was awarded the Edward Caird Award and South Lanarkshire Education award to allow her to continue her studies in a joint degree course between the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland and the University of Glasgow. She completed this course, Masters of Music in Historically Informed Performance, in September this year and has now begun her PhD studies in music at The University of Glasgow.

Brianna pursues both an academic and singing career. She won the Glasgow Music Festival's Opera and Oratorio section twice, where she also won the Judith Richmond Memorial certificate and the Janette

Clanahan Memorial Award. She was runner-up for Scotland in the national talent competition "Idol 2008" and in 2010, she was awarded first place in the opera category of the Edinburgh Music Speech and Dance Festival, where she also won the Alice J. Fleming medal.

Brianna is a scholar of the Glasgow University Chapel Choir and has toured with the choir to Germany, Switzerland and Italy and sung on BBC Radio 3, BBC Radio 4 and Smooth Radio. Upcoming engagements include touring to Amsterdam with the Glasgow University Chapel Choir, performing for the Hub Community Cafe in East Kilbride, and performing in many Christmas services throughout December. Penelope Cousland – Mezzo Soprano

Born in Glasgow, Penelope attended The High School of Glasgow and began her studies as a pianist and flautist, changing to become a first study singer the first year of her undergraduate degree. She obtained a Bachelor of Music Education Degree from the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama (now Royal Conservatoire of Scotland) and has worked as a Secondary school music teacher for the past two years. Penelope is now undergoing a Masters of Music in Solo Performance at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, studying with Barbara Robotham.



As a keen choral singer, Penelope has been part of many choirs and choruses in Scotland. She was a member of the National Youth Choir of Scotland for five years, taking part in the 2010 tour to Germany, singing with Ballet Rambert and taking part in the 15th Anniversary celebrations in 2011. Penelope was also a member of the Edinburgh Festival Chorus, performing large choral works such as Walton's Belshazzar's Feast, Rachmaninov's The Bells, Elgar's The Dream of Gerontius and Mahler's Symphony No. 8. She has also worked with the Scottish Chamber Orchestra Chorus for a performance of Berlioz' Tristia.

Penelope also enjoys singing in chamber choirs and is a member of Les Sirènes Female Chamber Choir, which has performed at prestigious venues across the UK including the SECC in Glasgow, the Bridgewater Hall in Manchester and the Royal Festival Hall in London. She is also a member of Caledonian Voices Chamber Choir and has performed in many venues across Scotland, singing the Alto solo in Britten's Rejoice in the Lamb.

Heather Lynn - Cello

Heather who is 16 and in her fifth year at Strathaven Academy, has been playing cello for six years. Previously studying with Betsy Taylor (cellist with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra) she is currently in her second year at the Junior Royal Conservatoire of Scotland in Glasgow where she studies under Dave O'Connell who played with the Berliner Philharmoniker. Dave says that Heather; 'brings a unique energy to all that she plays.'

She sang with the choir until 2011 when her work and performance schedule became too hectic to continue. Răzvan Luculescu

Răzvan was born in Bucharest, Romania. He studied piano and double bass at the Dinu Lipatti Music High School before moving on to the Universitatea Nationala de Muzica in Bucharest where he specialised in orchestral and choral conducting. On leaving university he became Assistant Chorus Master at the National Operetta Theatre Ion Dacian in Bucharest, where he was involved in coaching the choir and organising premieres. As a repetiteur he participated in numerous vocal competitions, masterclasses, and recitals in Romania and elsewhere. He also attended a conducting masterclass with Salvador Mas Conde in Vienna.



Răzvan founded the Modus Antiquus Ensemble and the Oratorio Chorus and acted as chorus master at a number of churches in Bucharest.

He gained conducting experience, over a period of 11 years, from various sources including (in Bucharest) The George Enescu Philharmonic, The National Theatre, The Oleg Danovschi National Theatre for Opera and Ballet Constanta, The Philharmonic Society Campina, The Pitesti Philarmonic, and (in Austria) The Sinfonietta Baden.

Răzvan moved to Scotland in 2010 in order to further his musical career. As well as being Strathaven Choral's accompanist and member of the Strathaven Singers, he is also Organist and Musical Director at Busby Parish Church, and is presently also Musical Director of Milngavie Choir, Accompanist for the East Renfrewshire Council and Glasgow Studio Ballet and Music Director at Hyndland Community Choir.

Christopher Barr Musical Director



Christopher Barr (BMus.Ed Hons) studied at the University of Aberdeen, studying voice with Gillian Jack. He is currently a member of The National Youth Choir of Scotland and the Edinburgh Festival Chorus.

Christopher's conducting studies began in 2003 where he was invited to attend and observe BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra Rehearsals. In 2005 he was invited, as a guest, to participate in the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland (RCS, formally the RSAMD), junior 'Youthworks' conducting master classes with Dr Alistair Mitchell. In 2008 and 2009 Christopher studied under the guidance of Mark Heron, Russell Cowieson and Timothy Reynish at the Royal Northern College of Music conductor training weekend. During these studies he conducted the RNCM orchestra and North Cheshire Wind Ensemble. In August 2010 Christopher received the 2010/11 ABCD (Association of British Choral Directors) apprenticeship which enabled him to study conducting with Alan Tavener and Gerard Doherty. During this apprenticeship Christopher worked with the University of Strathclyde Chamber Choir, Chorus and Symphony Orchestra. As part of the apprenticeship Christopher was invited to be a participant in a BBC Singers conducting master class in November 2010. In 2012 Christopher received the National Youth Choir of Scotland Student Conductor Bursary which allowed him to become the assistant conductor of the National Boys Choir of Scotland working under the guidance of Christopher Bell.

During 2007 Christopher successfully founded the 16 voice 'Legato Voices Choir' and co-founded the Aberdeen Student Sinfonia. Christopher was appointed Musical Director of the RGU Singers in 2009 and is currently the Musical Director of Strathaven Choral Society, East Renfrewshire Intermediate and Senior Youth Choirs, South Lanarkshire *Cultural Olympiad* Choir and the Bridge of Weir Choral Society. In 2012 Christopher was asked to be the children's choirmaster for Scottish Opera's production of 'Elephant Angel' in the Eastwood Park Theatre.

Christopher has participated in choral conducting master classes with Christopher Bell, Alan Tavener, Derek Clark, Stephen Layton, Paul Brough, Roger Williams MBE, Mike Brewer and Ralph Alwood.

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
